They are smart, savvy, industrious, and adventurous. They are extreme risk takers. It is incredible the number of setbacks they face in their quest. It is astonishing the lengths they go to and the hazards they endure, sometimes life-threatening dangers, to find gold. How deep would you dig to find gold?

We've all heard the myth that a pot of gold lies at the end of each rainbow. This is a legend that dates back to Old Europe, where it was believed, at least for a time, that fairies were real. Fairies were said to have great wealth, and would often bury their treasures or pots of gold at the end of the rainbow. This led to the fable that the end of the rainbow contained riches that could be found, and they would be guarded by leprechauns. How far would you search to find gold?

There is no doubt that gold is a precious metal, and it may well be financially prudent to invest in gold. It could be argued gold is the most valuable commodity on earth.

1 Peter 1:18-19

¹⁸You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold, ¹⁹but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish.

Given that assumption, let's consider this the words in 1 Peter 1:18-19 printed to the left. To Jesus, you and I are more valuable, of more worth, and held more dearly than gold. Let this truth sink in for a moment. We are so treasured by God that God gave up, not a million bars of solid gold, but God's only Son as a ransom for us, so that we could be redeemed, rescued, and released from sin and the final sting of death. The precious blood of Christ, the precious life of Christ was shed and given up for us!

To Jesus, you and I are worth risking life and limb, quite literally, to redeem. You and I are worth digging to the deepest depths to find and save. You and I are worth searching the farthest reaches of the universe to locate and rescue. To Jesus, you and I are more valuable, of more worth, than the most valuable commodity on earth.

Letting this truth settle into my bones is incredibly humbling. I look in the mirror and I see a person of value, but of *that much* value, that's hard to wrap my mind around. And, yet, that is exactly the price Jesus paid to save me, to save you, to save all whom God loves, from sin and death. This is deeply humbling and incredibly motivating. Knowing my value Jesus' eyes, I am moved to assess my thoughts, words, deeds, and prayers, so that I can daily grow to be a person worthy of such a costly sacrifice.

May you honor and own your value. To Jesus, dear one, you are more precious than gold.

Monthly expenses to date, for February, are \$ 7,785.84. Our general budget income for the month of February was \$ 3139.83, short due to the cancelled service on February 24.

For the month of February, we are short \$ 4,646.01.

Crossways Camping Ministries Capital Campaign

Crossways Camping Ministries is conducting a capital campaign in hopes of raising \$1.8 million in order to enable their three camps to be better utilized all year long-not just for summer camps. Through generous donations a couple of years ago, they were able to pay off all their debt, so they feel they are in a good position to have a capital campaign. The last one was 27 years ago.

Improvements at Waypost by Mission Lake (which is the oldest facility and most in need of improvements) will be a dining hall addition, kitchen equipment upgrades, a director's office addition, and remodeling of the bathhouse for a total of \$631,750. If the campaign raises more than the base amount, additional projects could include construction of a new maintenance/storage building, a new staff duplex, and a covered pavilion for a total of \$400,000. (Our youth attend confirmation camp at Waypost.) Improvements would also be made at Imago Dei Village by Clintonville (\$558,350 base/ +\$115,045 challenge) and at Pine Lake Camp by Waupaca (\$333,431 base/ +\$272,012 challenge).

Annually about 4000 children and adults participate in Crossways programs, camps, and retreats. Youth who attend Christian camps realize that religion is relevant and faith matters. They continue after camp with increased devotional practices, improved self-confidence, and greater engagement in church. 62% of seminarians said that camp helped them decide to become pastors.

101 congregations, including Redeemer, help support Crossways annually, and another 60 help when possible. This capital campaign is not from church budgets-but from individuals who feel moved to help. Contributions can be spread over 3 years or you could choose to just send a one-time gift. Any amount would be appreciated.

March 10-short temple talk following worship and video in gathering space to introduce campaign

March 17-Childrens' Time: children sing "This Little Light of Mine" followed by camp puppet show. Camp video in basement along with reception for Bishop Mansholt following worship.

March 24-Childrens' Time: camp puppet show

March 31-short temple talk-"Camp memories"

April 7-Children's Time: children lead congregation in camp song "Body, Shake, Rap." Children distribute and collect pledge sheets from congregation. (You can write "Not at this time" on the pledge sheet if you choose.)

April 14-Additional pledge sheets will be available if you weren't in church on the 7th. Total amount pledged so far will be announced.

- Provides year-round programming for all ages to learn more about themselves, God, the world, and our response to God's love through lives of faithfulness.

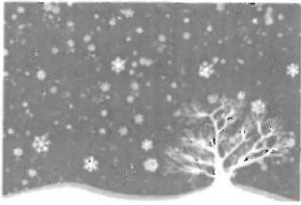

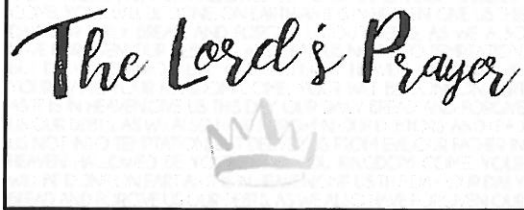

Sunday Morning Worship Focus: Prayer/The Lord's Prayer

Traditionally Ash Wednesday's reading from Matthew 6 omits verses 7-15, Jesus' instructions to the disciples on how to pray.

However, this year we will include these verses and consider together, during Lent, the faith practice of prayer, especially praying The Lord's Prayer. Here are a few suggestions for focusing on The Lord's Prayer at home:

- * If you don't do so already, during Lent, challenge yourself and those in your household to pray The Lord's Prayer every day.
- * Parents, spend these 40 days of Lent teaching your children The Lord's Prayer, if they do not know it already and/or other prayers.
- * Look up Luke 11:1-13 and Matthew 6:5-15. Compare and contrast these verses. Sunday's sermons will focus on the petitions of The Lord's Prayers.

**Sensing the Gospel: Mid-Week Lenten Series
March & April 2019**

In Jesus Christ, the salvation God provides cannot be reduced to an abstract idea. Salvation happens, instead, in human flesh. Indeed, God arrives to us as human flesh. Moreover, people encountered Jesus in and with their bodies. There were real people in real contact with a real man from Galilee. Even today, we encounter God and God's salvation in and with our bodies. Lent provides opportunities to acknowledge this.

For our mid-week worship, we will partner with Pastor Lois Graper and the congregations of the United Lutheran Parish; Pastor Paul Johnson and The Lutheran Church of the Wilderness in Bowler to explore the ways we experience and receive Jesus through our senses.
