#8 - Educational Engagement

Christian Education is a life-long process that enriches a person's spiritual life and better prepares him or her for service in the world. The Educational Engagement Index measures the degree to which members share in that understanding, It also gauges the degree to which the church provides developmentally appropriate education across the entire span of life. In addition, it recognizes that members are living with a variety of schedules and that education must be provided in a way that adapts to member needs. Takeaways:

Christian education is for people of all ages, from 0-100+ years of age. Being a disciple of Jesus means you are a lifelong learner.

In today's culture, people's lifestyles are complex and schedules vary. In addition, the way that people get information or learn is complex and varied. Worship can be a driver of life-long learning. What ways do you learn? How do your children learn?

Compared to the thousands of congregations (across varied denominations) in the CAT survey database, in terms of the church providing a variety of opportunities for learning and spiritual growth (question #2) is ranked in the approximately 8th percentile.

In terms of percentages, the CAT survey wants to see higher percentages in the "Agree" and "Strongly Agree" categories. Those in the "Tend to Disagree" and "Tend to Agree" are known as "sitting on the fence." They are unsure or uncertain how they feel about the educational and spiritual growth opportunities. Approximately two-thirds of the respondents are unsure about all three questions.

What other ways can people grow spiritually or learn about the Lutheran faith in addition to Sunday School, Confirmation, VBS, and weekday Bible study? How do you make spiritual growth a priority?

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
